





Poor Richard's Almanack was a yearly almanac published by Benjamin Franklin, who adopted the pseudonym of "Poor Richard" or "Richard Saunders". The publication appeared from 1732 to 1758. It sold as a pamphlet published in the Thirteen Colonies. It is remembered for Franklin's **apothegms**. (Wp)

Franklin borrowed the name "Richard Saunders" from the seventeenth-century author of *Rider's British Merlin*, a London almanac which was published throughout the eighteenth century. Franklin created the **Poor Richard** persona based in part on Jonathan Swift's pseudonymous character, "Isaac Bickerstaff". (Wp)

Men take more pains to mask than mend.
